<u>Course description:</u> This course aims to improve your Chinese proficiency to the intermediate-high or advanced level. By taking the course, you are expected to learn how to describe social phenomena, to argue for/against a point of view, and to make comments on abstract issues/concepts. Another important goal of the course is to train you to deliver paragraph-length speech, instead of just scattered sentences.

Language learning is no easy task, which requires a lot of time and effort. You need to study each lesson carefully **BEFORE CLASS** and **BE PPREPARED FOR CLASS ACTIVITY & DISCUSSION**.

Five lessons will be covered in the semester. We will spend two weeks or so on each lesson. Below is the tentative schedule for each lesson.

Day 1 and Day 2: Please study the vocabulary of the lesson on Quizlet before class (follow the link on lecture ppt). Next read and learn the lecture ppt before class. Lesson text audios are provided in the lecture ppt, so make sure you listen to it as well (ideally a few times). We plan to spend two class meetings to finish every lesson's lecture.

A small quiz is given before either class on HuskyCT, not for grading, just for the purpose of preparation!

Day 2: Vocabulary quiz (typing)

We will be using the Wechat and Kahoot regularly when we are having synchronous sessions. Please make sure you have Wechat installed on your smart phone or your computer.

Day 3: Quiz to check on grammar and vocabulary (kahoot). Text recording homework due before class and sentence quiz at the beginning of class (typing and translation, maybe on

WeChat or some other platforms). Discussion on the text and other related topics in class. Inclass reading and writing (typing on Padlet or google slides):

Day 4: Quiz to check on text comprehension (kahoot). Pair or group presentation on a given topic and review for chapter test. Edpuzzle listening materials related to the text.

Day 5: Chapter test on HuskyCT.

Day 6: Movie discussion/Reading 画皮. You need to watch the movie or complete the designated reading pages before class in order to get involved in the discussion in class. You need to complete the discussion questions before class on HuskyCT.

<u>Homework assignment</u>: There will be one homework assignment (multiple choice questions, fill in the blanks, and answer questions related to the text, or short essay questions) for every unit on HuskyCT.

Movie discussion/Reading 画皮: Every time we complete one lesson, we will either watch a movie or read from a Chinese book (extensive reading) to improve your Chinese reading and speaking proficiency.

For the movies, you need to watch the movie before class and be ready to discuss it in class. You do not have to know every word in the movie. Our in-class discussion focuses on the movie theme, character analysis, and cross-cultural comparison. A short quiz on the story/plot of the movie will be given at the beginning of the day of movie discussion. The movie titles and links will be announced ahead of time so that you have enough time to watch it, ideally with friends or classmates, and prepare for the movie discussion.

For the additional reading, you will read on the assigned chapters, ideally with friends, before class, and need to be ready to talk about the story there. Most of the stories are short stories which are carefully written to increase your exposure to characters at a certain level. So the goal of the additional reading is to help you review/relearn old characters and learn some new frequently used and important ones.

After the movie/additional reading class, you need to post a critical summary (300-400 characters) on the discussion board of HusyCT, in which you briefly summarize the movie/book, and present and support your opinion on the issue(s) raised. Besides, everyone is required to read and comment upon at least one summary written by others.

<u>Oral presentation:</u> One oral presentation during the mid-term period (topic and grading rubrics will be given ahead of time)

- 1. You will give a formal speech on a topic that we have discussed so far (旅游, 食物, 人口 or something else you are interested in; or your though after watching 人在**囧途** or reading 画皮)
- 2. 2-3 minutes;

- 3. Need to record your presentation and submit the link to the discussion board.
- 4. Note that you can not read, but can refer to flashcard once in a while. Reading from notes will lead to huge mark-down.
- 5. Try to only use words that you know, especially those we have just learned. Provide the glossary for the words that your classmates may not know on PPT.
- 6. After the oral presentation deadline, you need to watch at least two classmates' oral presentations and provide peer assessment (peer assessment forms will be used)

<u>Final project:</u> There will be a final project for groups in 3s or 4s. You can choose to work on a brochure on one issue that we have discussed or provide Chinese dubbing to one movie you choose (5-6 minutes). Try to use as many words/structures that we have used this semester as possible in your group project.

November 6th, Friday: Script draft of the final project (share with instructor via google doc);

November 20th, Friday: Final project due on discussion board of HuskyCT.
